Minutes of the ARKANSAS NATURAL RESOURCES COMMISSION

March 27, 2013

The regular meeting of the Arkansas Natural Resources Commission was held Wednesday, March 27, 2013, at 9:30 a.m., at the office of the Arkansas Natural Resources Commission, 101 East Capitol, Suite 350, Little Rock, Arkansas.

Commissioners in attendance were Chair Ann Cash; Vice-Chair Corbet Lamkin, Neal Anderson, Don Richardson, Sloan Hampton, Fred Fowlkes, Jerry Hunton, and David Feilke.

Chairman Cash called the meeting of the Arkansas Natural Resources Commission to order.

APPROVAL OF MINUTES; JANUARY 23, 2013

Upon motion by Dr. Lamkin, second by Mr. Richardson, the Commission approved the minutes of the January 23, 2013, regular meeting.

REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

Employee Recognition - Mr. Young presented ten and twenty-year service certificates to Kevin McGaughey and Mike Guess respectively for their service to the State of Arkansas.

Update on Response from Red River Compact Commission's Louisiana Commissioners regarding Boeuf River Streamflow Allocation – Mr. Young stated that the Red River Compact Commission (RRCC) oversees the equitable allocation of water in the Red River between Arkansas, Texas, Oklahoma, and Louisiana, specifically with regard to the stream in Reach IV which flows from Arkansas into Louisiana. A response was written to Louisiana who alleges that they are not getting their fair share of the water that flows from Arkansas into Louisiana. They are encouraging ANRC to take whatever steps are available to ensure that they get their equitable share.

The RRCC doesn't commit Arkansas to guarantee a set flow into Louisiana, but it has a target level in cfs. We have responded to Louisiana that in order for us to develop an allocation plan, we would have to determine the 'weekly runoff'. The Engineering Committee for the RRCC has been working for at least 15 years trying to reach an agreement between the engineers of Louisiana and Arkansas on how best to calculate. Until we have an agreement on how to calculate the 'weekly runoff', there is no way this Commission can move forward with developing an allocation plan because if we do, and they don't agree, we would be in court.

The RRCC is meeting on April 23 in Louisiana, and in advance of that meeting Chairman Cash and Mr. Young plan to meet with Louisiana counterparts. Both Chairman Cash and Mr. Young are in agreement that the long-term solution to this problem is getting the Boeuf-Tensas Irrigation Project constructed. They hope to convince Louisiana to join with ANRC and the Corps to get the Feasibility Study completed so that the project can be authorized and constructed.

State Wetland Mitigation Bank Program – The Commission has had a committee working with the staff and Mr. Steve Whitehead, a private mitigation bank manager, to explore a possible resolution to the state competing with the private sector mitigation banks.

Mr. Whitehead's senator has recently introduced a shell bill addressing the issue. The senator will only move forward with the bill if the Commission and Mr. Whitehead reach an

agreement on what is an equitable resolution. Our staff has been working on an amendment of that bill dealing with the Commission's oversight of all mitigation banks. Mr. Young requested Mrs. Ray, our associate general counsel, to present an outline of that amendment.

Mrs. Ray stated that she has been working with other ANRC staff on this amendment. The first issue is to make a distinction between public mitigation banks, permittee responsible mitigation banks, and private mitigation banks. As it stands now, the law only addresses a public mitigation bank selling credits. The amendment would add authority for the Commission and the Executive Director to require private mitigation banks to obtain a permit to construct, to sell credits, and then to operate the bank. That includes the submission of an annual report after the credits have been sold so that ANRC can ensure that these banks continue to function in an ecologically-sound manner and perform to the standards, at a minimum, of what the Corps of Engineers requires.

The permit application fee at this time has been set at \$500 with an annual fee of \$100. Violation of the statutory code would involve a hearing through the Administrative process, and the Commission would have the discretion to fine per violation, per day, up to \$10,000, along with the right to revoke the permit.

Mr. Whitehead suggested that ANRC only mitigate state jobs, because the private sector cannot compete with the state's low cost of credits. He believes that the private sector can operate with more flexibility and can operate more banks. Eventually, the price would improve and would benefit the people of Arkansas. As long as the state continues to sell at its low rates, it discourages the private sector from operating. The state is limited on the price that it can purchase land which limits the location of land, whereas the private sector would not have those limitations.

Mr. Young said he and staff will plan to meet with Mr. Whitehead next week. Time is of the essence because the general assembly will only be in session for another four weeks.

Report on Eoff Dam – Mr. Young requested Mrs. Ray to brief the Commission on the Eoff dam. Mrs. Ray advised that Mr. Dan Eoff constructed a very large dam in Clinton, Arkansas without following ANRC's Rules Governing Design and Operation of Dams, or obtaining any permits from local, state, or federal agencies.

A hearing was scheduled for May 15th in Clinton to hear evidence, with the goal of having Mr. Eoff remove the dam safely. Staff has conducted site visits to the dam and has spoken with Mr. Eoff's attorney on the matter. Mr. Eoff has verbally agreed to hire a licensed professional engineer and to comply with the removal procedure within the timeline set forth by staff.

Staff recommends giving Mr. Eoff 60 days to submit acceptable plans to safely remove the dam. If Mr. Eoff does not remove the dam, then staff recommends scheduling a hearing to present evidence.

Mr. Richardson commented that he would like to give Mr. Eoff an opportunity to begin the process of removing the dam with the caveat that he sign a document agreeing to comply with the removal procedure and timeline set forth.

Mr. Young stated that after staff receives the signed document from Mr. Eoff, staff will approve it, but if he doesn't sign the document, staff will recommend that a public hearing be scheduled. A special meeting may have to be called if Mr. Eoff does not comply with removing the dam.

The Commission had no objections to staff's recommendations.

STATUS OF FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE PROGRAMS

Mrs. Cynthia Bearden presented the financial assistance report. (Copy of report attached to the minutes). She also reported that staff conducted nine additional financial reviews since January.

FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE

NON-PERFORMING LOANS

WEST CROSSETT SEWER FACILITIES BOARD

Mr. Bennett stated that the West Crossett Sewer Facilities Board is the first in a series of non-performing loan entities scheduled to come before the Commission. He said that this Board was created in Ashley County for the construction of a sewer system through funding provided by the Arkansas Community and Economic Development Program and ANRC. The original financing anticipated approximately 460 customers to repay the loan. Currently, the system has approximately 242 customers because the remainder of potential customers failed to connect to the system and the Facilities Board has no power to enforce the requirement to connect. Commissioner Lamkin and Mr. Young met with Mr. George Hart, Board Treasurer, and The Honorable Dennis Holland, Ashley County Judge, on February 28, 2013, in Hamburg to discuss a repayment plan.

Mr. Bennett introduced Judge Holland to speak on behalf of the West Crossett Sewer Facilities Board. Judge Holland reiterated that Mr. Hart requests that the remainder of the loans outstanding be forgiven. He stated that the project engineer mishandled the project and misrepresented the customer base. He also stated that the board has been inactive for over two years.

Chairman Cash pointed out that the Commission has an obligation to the citizens of the State of Arkansas to protect loan funds. She said that avenues would be pursued to bring about an acceptable resolution for both parties.

Judge Holland said that he would contact Mr. Hart and meet with the Facilities Board. Chairman Cash thanked Judge Holland for attending the meeting.

Mr. Bennett stated that negotiations had stalled with Mr. Hart. Chairman Cash noted that she personally knew Mr. Hart and would contact him to work toward a resolution.

Dr. Lamkin noted that this project did not originate with the Commission. Mr. Bennett stated that funding was provided by an ACEDP grant then administered through the Arkansas Economic Development Commission. The project significantly exceeded the engineer's estimate and the Commission subsequently loaned the funds to complete the project with the understanding that there would be 460 customers connected to the system.

Upon motion by Mr. Anderson, second by Mr. Fowlkes, the Commission approved authorizing the Executive Director to work with the Facilities Board to bring the Board back into full operations, including, without limitation, making the Board functional and raising the rate to a level sufficient to operate, maintain, and replace the system, and pay required debt service.

If the Executive Director determines that the Facilities Board has completed the requirements, he is authorized to forgive loan 00288-WSSW-D and revise the terms of loan PAB-96A6 to a new term of 30 years and an interest rate of 1.5%.

APPLICATIONS FOR FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE

Mr. Bennett presented staff recommendations for the referenced projects below requesting financial assistance from the Water, Sewer & Solid Waste Fund (WSSW); the Water Development Fund (WDF); and the Arkansas Water, Waste Disposal and Pollution Abatement Facilities General Obligation Bond Program (CGO).

Upon motion by Mr. Anderson, second by Mr. Feilke, the Commission approved the following recommendations:

BODCAW (NEVADA COUNTY) (WSSW)

Up to \$77,250.00

PURPOSE OF FUNDS: To make repairs and upgrades at the water storage tanks and line improvements to comply with ADH disinfectant byproducts rule. Improvements to high service pump to allow more efficient pump operation.

The Commission approved a loan for Bodcaw in an amount up to \$77,250.00 from the Water, Sewer & Solid Waste Fund. This loan is for twenty (20) years at three percent (3%) interest. An administrative fee in an amount up to \$2,250.00 is to be retained by the Commission. Approval is contingent upon the town establishing and maintaining a depreciation reserve fund.

BODCAW (NEVADA COUNTY) (WSSW)

Up to \$180,250.00

PURPOSE OF FUNDS: To make repairs and upgrades at the water storage tanks and line improvements to comply with ADH disinfectant byproducts rule. Improvements to high service pump to allow more efficient pump operation.

The Commission approved a grant for Bodcaw in an amount up to \$180,250.00 from the Water, Sewer & Solid Waste Fund. An administrative fee in an amount up to \$5,250.00 is to be retained by the Commission. Approval is contingent upon the town establishing and maintaining a depreciation reserve fund. Grant and loan funds will be utilized on a 3:1 ratio.

CRAWFORDSVILLE (CRITTENDEN COUNTY) (WSSW)

Up to \$36,050.00

PURPOSE OF FUNDS: To extend gravity sewer service to approximately 100 customers in the Lansing and Grassey Lake communities in Crittenden County.

The Commission approved a loan for Crawfordsville in an amount up to \$36,050.00 from the Water, Sewer & Solid Waste Fund. This loan is for twenty (20) years at three percent (3%) interest. An administrative fee in an amount up to \$1,050.00 is to be retained by the Commission. Approval is contingent upon the city establishing and maintaining a depreciation reserve fund. Additional funds for this project will be provided by the Water – Wastewater Program of the Arkansas Community and Economic Development Program.

WILTON (LITTLE RIVER) (WSSW)

Up to \$309,000.00

PURPOSE OF FUNDS: To replace and upgrade five sewer lift stations with submersible pumps.

The Commission approved a loan for Wilton in an amount up to \$309,000.00 from the Water, Sewer & Solid Waste Fund. This loan is for ten (10) years at two and one-half percent (2.5%) interest. An administrative fee in an amount up to \$9,000.00 is to be retained by the Commission. Approval is contingent upon the city establishing and maintaining a depreciation reserve fund.

HAYNES (LEE COUNTY) (WSSW) ADDITIONAL

Up to \$5,150.00

PURPOSE OF FUNDS: Emergency pump station repairs.

The Commission approved a grant for Haynes in an amount up to \$5,150.00 from the Water, Sewer and Solid Waste Fund. The Director may disburse funds to Arkansas Rural Water Association, Inc. for costs incurred by Arkansas Rural Water in making repairs to the station. An administrative fee in an amount up to \$150.00 is to be retained by the Commission. Approval is contingent upon the town maintaining a depreciation reserve.

SOUTHWEST BOONE COUNTY WATER ASSOCIATION (WDF)

Up to \$41,200.00

PURPOSE OF FUNDS: To provide water service along Deaf School Road.

The Commission approved a grant for Southwest Boone County Water Association in an amount up to \$41,200.00 from the Water Development Fund. An administrative fee in an amount up to \$1,200.00 is to be retained by the Commission. These funds will be used to match locally provided funds on a 1:1 ratio. Approval is contingent upon the association establishing and maintaining a depreciation reserve fund.

TULL (GRANT COUNTY) (WDF)

Up to \$309,000.00

PURPOSE OF FUNDS: Maintenance and upgrades to the Highway 190 water tank to comply with ADH disinfectant byproducts rule.

The Commission approved a loan for Tull in an amount up to \$309,000.00 from the Water Development Fund. This loan is for ten (10) years at two and one-half percent (2.5%) interest. An administrative fee in an amount up to \$9,000.00 is to be retained by the Commission. Approval is contingent upon the town establishing and maintaining a depreciation reserve fund.

LEPANTO (POINSETT COUNTY) (CGO)

Up to \$1,030,000.00

PURPOSE OF FUNDS: To replace leaking small diameter galvanized water lines located primarily in the downtown area of the city.

The Commission approved loan for Lepanto for funding from the Arkansas Water, Waste Disposal and Pollution Abatement Facilities General Obligation Bond Program in an amount not to exceed \$1,030,000.00. The project approved in this resolution is to be funded from the proceeds of the State of Arkansas Water, Waste Disposal and Pollution Abatement Facilities General Obligation Bonds (the "Bonds"). All documents evidencing the commitment for financing and completion of the project mentioned in this resolution shall be subject to modification, amendment for further conditions to comply with the rules and regulations (including all amendments thereto), which the Commission may adopt, from time to time in order to comply with the covenants concerning the Bonds.

The loan terms and interest rate are to be set by the Executive Director with a repayment schedule of up to thirty (30) years.

Staff is hereby directed to negotiate a "Memorandum of Agreement" with the above named applicant as provided for in the Section 502.1 of Title V, Administrative Rules and Regulations for Financial Assistance, within 60 days.

Approval is contingent upon the availability of any other required funds and upon completion of all statutory and regulatory requirements within a period of 180 days. An administrative fee of three percent (3%) will be collected by the Commission at loan closing.

The Executive Director is authorized to utilize funds from the Water Development Fund or Water, Sewer and Solid Waste Fund to provide funding for this project if he determines that funds from the State of Arkansas Water, Waste Disposal and Pollution Abatement Facilities General Obligation Bonds are not available or that it is in the best interest of the Commission that the project be funded from one of the alternative sources.

If he determines to fund the project from the alternative source, all other terms shall remain the same and he shall report the change in funding source to the Commission at its next regular meeting.

WEST FORK (WASHINGTON COUNTY) (CWRLF)

Up to \$1,200,000.00

PURPOSE OF FUNDS: Improvements and betterments necessary to transport wastewater to Fayetteville for treatment and demolition of the city's existing sewer treatment plant.

The Commission approved funds for West Fork in an amount up to \$1,200,000.00 of which the total amount will be in the form of a loan with principal forgiveness for the city of West Fork from the Arkansas Clean Water State Revolving Loan Fund in accordance with the established funding priorities. Approval is contingent upon the city establishing and maintaining a depreciation reserve fund.

WEST FORK (WASHINGTON COUNTY) (CWRLF)

Up to \$4,100,000.00

PURPOSE OF FUNDS: Improvements and betterments necessary to transport wastewater to Fayetteville for treatment and demolition of the city's existing sewer treatment plant.

The Commission approved loan funds for West Fork in an amount up to \$4,100,000.00 for West Fork from the Arkansas Clean Water State Revolving Loan Fund in accordance with the established funding priorities.

The loan repayment schedule will not exceed twenty (20) years. The Executive Director will set the combined annual borrower rate and loan terms.

CHANGE IN TERMS OF FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE

Upon motion by Mr. Fowlkes, second by Mr. Anderson, the Commission approved the following change in terms:

ELM SPRINGS (WASHINGTON COUNTY)

(00299-CGO-L)

On March 21, 2003, the Commission approved a loan in the amount of \$1,640,000 for construction of a sewer system for the city. The loan was for 30 years at a rate of 5.4 percent interest. The city has installed a subsurface discharge sewer system with limited success. The city is current with its payments under the terms of the loan, but having to transfer funds from its general fund to make the payments. The current loan balance is \$1,498,467.00. The current situation has created a hardship on the city.

The Commission has been able to refund the bonds it issued to provide funds for the loan reducing the cost of funds to the state. Therefore the Executive Director is authorized to take steps necessary to reduce the interest rate on loan 00299-CGO-L to four percent (4%).

GRADY (LINCOLN COUNTY)

(00876-WDF-L)

On September 21, 2011, the Commission approved loan 00876-WDF-L in an amount up to \$206,000 for repair and upgrades to its elevated tank. During a recent storm event the system developed significant water hammer creating several major leaks in the water distribution system. The city has requested approval to use designated loan funds for repairs to the distribution system.

The purpose for which Loan 00876-WDF-L was approved is amended to add repairs to the city's water distribution system. All other terms and conditions remain the same.

Mr. Richardson also noticed that other districts have had vacancies for an extended period of time. The Commission should be encouraging the districts to fill these vacancies in a timely manner. He has asked that Mr. Baber produce a list of districts that have vacancies before each Commission meeting and he plans to contact them.

CERTIFICATION OF 2013 ELECTION RESULTS – CONSERVATION DISTRICT BOARDS

Mr. Richardson questioned why there were only two elected positions filled in Calhoun County. Mr. Baber stated that there were no candidates to run for the position. He requested the help of the Commission to submit candidates to him. Mr. Richardson advised that he will be in contact with these districts to assist them.

Mr. Richardson inquired if the election was proper since only two of three positions were filled. Mrs. Phelps stated that it would be valid. Upon motion by Mr. Richardson, second by Dr. Lamkin, the Commission approved certification of the 2013 election results with the expectation of Calhoun County presenting an explanation of why its vacancy has not been filled (a copy of the results is attached to minutes). Dr. Lamkin suggested that the Calhoun County Conservation District director appear before the Commission at its next meeting and the explanation be a part of their activity report.

CONSERVATION DISTRICT ACTIVITY REPORT – Mr. Clay Durham introduced Mr. Dennis Hackbart with the Pulaski County Conservation District. Mr. Hackbart gave an overview of the many activities conducted by the district. Some of the programs the district is involved in are: beaver control, water registration, technical assistance initiative with NRCS, and rain gauge program.

WATER RESOURCES MANAGEMENT DIVISION

2012 Non-Point Source Pollution Reduction Program Report – Mr. Swaim introduced Mr. Tony Ramick to present the report. Mr. Ramick introduced staff members working in the 319 section. The 319 program was dedicated to this agency in 1990 and has been active since its inception. There is a lot of diversity in the projects that come under the umbrella of 319. Agriculture has always done a good job of conservation, but now there is a need to address urban sprawl areas.

The following projects were highlighted: Larkin Creek Sediment Prevention Demonstration Project; Enhancement of Riparian Buffer Inventorying Algorithm for Field Use (StreBanD); and the Illinois River Watershed Partnership (IRWP). The IRWP and BWD Rain Garden Demonstration Projects will implement 30 demonstration rain gardens in highly visible public and semi-public locations within each watershed. Rain gardens are designed to treat small volumes of runoff through a physical and biological transformation process and remove pollutants through biological transformation involving the water, soil, plants, and biota within the garden. Eighteen rain gardens have been completed in total collectively treating over 61,000 feet of impervious areas.

Update on Arkansas Water Plan - Mr. Swaim gave a brief update on the water plan. Work is continuing on 'supply/demand' projections. The major demand areas are agriculture, industry, including hydraulic fracture, thermoelectric power generation, navigation, and municipal water supply. Technical memoranda are currently being drafted, and each of these components will contain data forecasting, and demand calculations over the planning horizon of 2050.

There will be another 'demand' working group meeting in May. One hundred people are expected to attend that meeting to discuss data. This will be in preparation for presenting drafts to the public in June. The supply work is ramping up and staff is working to get volunteers to commit to review data numbers and to help calculate supply availability. Public meetings will be held in the fall and staff will continue to make presentations around the state to various organizations as well as AACD area meetings.

Work is being done to expand the website to populate with even more information. Larger capacity will be needed to navigate the site to hold the upcoming reports.

Mr. Swaim welcomed interested parties to attend all upcoming meetings.
