

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Partner Agencies in Conservation and Fire Participate in Annual Prescribed Burn School

LITTLE ROCK, AR – Forty participants from fourteen conservation and fire partners across the state participated in the 2017 Arkansas Prescribed Fire as a Management Tool Workshop held September 25-29 at Camp Robinson. The workshop, commonly referred to as Prescribed Burn School, has been held since 1997 and is organized by the Arkansas Prescribed Fire Council.

The course is taught by instructors from participating agencies on the Arkansas Prescribed Fire Council and brings together a wealth of knowledge and experience for burn planning, forest management, firefighting, and conservation in one forum. Students are required to complete outdoor prescribed burns in wooded and grassy sites under supervision, and must pass a rigorous test at the end of the course covering specific details about prescribed burn plans, weather factors and influences, safety protocols, public engagement and liability, and more. Students are required to pass this course before qualifying to oversee prescribed burns in their respective agencies.

The class is open to private, state, and federal agencies, and forest industry personnel. The forty students in the 2017 Prescribed Burn School include participants from: Arkansas Forestry Commission, Arkansas Game and Fish Commission, Arkansas Natural Heritage Commission, State Parks of Arkansas, Arkansas National Guard/Camp Robinson, Camp Robinson Fire Department, Central Arkansas Water, Chloeta, Green Bay Packaging, Natural Resources Conservation Service, The Nature Conservancy in Arkansas, University of Arkansas at Monticello School of Forestry and Natural Resources, U.S. Corps of Engineers, and U.S. Fish & Wildlife Service.

Prescribed fire is used for the following six primary management purposes: 1) Wildlife habitat improvement, 2) Reduction of hazardous, flammable fuels, 3) Disposal of logging debris, 4) Site preparation for new seedlings, 5) Management of competing vegetation, and 6) Forest insect and disease control.
