## **National Fire Protection Association and State Farm Fund Four Arkansas Community Preparedness Day Projects**

Little Rock, Arkansas –The National Fire Protection Association (NFPA) and State Farm awarded 150 winners funding for Wildfire Community Preparedness Day projects, including four in Arkansas. Hot Springs Village (Garland County), West Fork (Washington County), Gravette (Benton County) and Bald Knob (White County) will receive \$500 grants to support activities that reduce potential loss of life, property and natural resources to wildfire.

Winning participants worked collaboratively with local fire departments, foresters, school districts and others to come up with projects and describe how this funding would help them reduce their risk of loss from wildfire. Projects range from work with youth, assistance to fire departments, fuel reduction, education and outreach, post–fire recovery and more. West Fork, Gravette, Bald Knob, and Hot Springs Village are communities also involved with the Arkansas Firewise Program – a wildfire preparedness grant initiative that works with the NFPA National Firewise Program to create local solutions for wildfire safety. Arkansas Firewise involves homeowners, community leaders, firefighters, and others in creating fire-adapted communities - places where people and property are safer from the risk of brush, grass, and forest fires. Arkansas currently leads the nation in recognized Firewise communities, with 166 communities active in the program in 2016.
